Regular Jams

Note these changes for the jams in March:

- the First Thursday Jam is NOT happening at Fort Negley and is NOT a slow jam, and
- the Fourth Sunday Jam will happen on the Fifth Sunday – NOT on Easter Sunday

First Thursday Jam – March 6th at Cedar Forest Lodge at Cedars of Lebanon State Park, probably starting as people arrive and start looking to play, usually late afternoon. This jam welcomes folks coming in for the weekend for *Breakin' Up Winter* and is usually a pretty big one. The fact of even more smiling than usual has to do with greeting old friends we've not seen in a while and knowing we'll get to spend time with them over the course of the weekend. Come share some tunes in a beautiful WPA built wood and stone meetinghouse.

Second Thursday Regular Jam – March 13th, 6:30 to 8:30 or later, at Buchanan Log House, 2910 Elm Hill Pike. Tunes are played from moderate to up-to-speed for players familiar with their instruments, the genre and picking up tunes by ear. All skill levels are welcome and all are encouraged to play along. A list of tunes frequently played by the group is available. The third Thursday jam has the same focus.

Third Thursday Regular Jam – Again at Ft. Negley Visitors Center, March 20th, 6:30 to 8:30. This is a central Nashville jam. Tunes are not broken down, but will be played moderately if new to the group. Tunes from the list as well as new ones are played.

Directions to the 5th Sunday Jam

This month's 4th-Sunday Jam will be held in Bowling Green, Kentucky, on the campus of Western Kentucky University, just 60 or so miles up the road from Nashville. We will meet in the Pioneer Log Cabin, which is immediately next to the Kentucky Building (also called the Kentucky Museum). The cabin is equipped with a number of folding chairs, unless you prefer to bring your own.

From Nashville, take I-65 north to Exit 20, and go west on the William H. Natcher Parkway. From the parkway, take Exit 4 and turn right (north) onto Highway 31-W. (There is a sign for Western Kentucky University at this exit.)

Take highway 31-W all the way up to University Boulevard, and turn left (west). Follow the boulevard to the Pioneer Log Cabin and the Kentucky Building (about 4 miles from Exit 4 off the parkway). Both The Pioneer Log Cabin and the Kentucky Building are on the right. On the left, you will see a large parking lot. Park there. Caution: You will see the Pioneer Log Cabin just before you reach the Kentucky Building. After you pass the Kentucky Building, you will see a second log cabin, but that is the wrong one.

Here are further details:

Parking is available only on the left side of University Blvd., just past the Pioneer Cabin. The parking on the right side of the street is reserved for visitors to the Kentucky Museum. Just park in one of the official WKU parking lots on the left just past the Pioneer Cabin, as the university police do not require parking permits on weekends and visitors can park there. There is a defunct set of businesses with parking space directly across from the Pioneer Cabin, but also a warning not to park there.

As you follow the above directions and turn left on University Blvd. (follow the brown signs toward the Kentucky Museum), just continue along University Blvd. as it takes you through the Western Kentucky campus past residence halls and other buildings. When you pass Diddle Arena on the right you are getting pretty close. University Blvd. will split not far after the next traffic signal and the Pioneer Cabin (a.k.a. the Folklife Center) will be almost immediately on your right.
